





What We Offer

Our Social Work Model with a trauma-informed approach makes our writing programs uniquely suited to responding to our participants' needs.

Workshops are facilitated by a social worker, alongside our writing teachers, to ensure participants social and emotional needs are met.

Our strengths-based model employs mutual aid to facilitate a sense of community and support in our workshops.





PRISON WRITES BRINGS WRITING WORKSHOPS TO INCARCERATED, DETAINED, AND FORMERLY INCARCERATED PEOPLE FOR THERAPY, ADVOCACY, LITERACY, AND MORE.

THERAPEUTIC WRITING

Participants are guided in writing about traumatic events in their lives so they may improve their overall emotional state and functioning.

ADVOCACY

Participants are guided in writing about their experience in the criminal justice system. This can later be used as supportive material for their case or to inform prison policy and reform.

CREATIVE WRITING

Participants are supported in writing personal narratives in various genres to better understand their history and envision a resilient and positive future.





Director's Desk

Jessica Hall

We began 2020 with a reading in January at the Museum of Reclaimed Urban Space. The event featured formerly incarcerated writers, including: our advisory board member Karen Thomas; Nadine West, a student in our writing group with women in re-entry at Taconic Correctional facility; and writing workshop participant, Justin Corney.

I made weekly visits, along with writing instructor Tim O'Mara, to our young friends at Rikers Island Jail. In January and February, we completed a therapeutic writing intensive for adult males at Rikers, through our partnership with John Jay College Institute for Justice and Opportunity.

Writing instructors Charles Salzberg, Christina Chiu, and myself were looking forward to continuing our workshops with men at Otisville Correctional Facility, also through John Jay.

Our last day teaching in-person at Rikers Island Jail was March 12, 2020. Shortly thereafter, due to Covid-19 lockdown, our partners ceased all in-person programming. We immediately transitioned by sending weekly lesson plans to the jail. Workshops with John Jay were held on Zoom.

Scattered to various remote locales during the lockdown, we grew closer to our communities. We advocated for our incarcerated friends to have access to PPE, cleaning supplies, and hand sanitizer. And we advocated for releasing populations from prison and jails to reduce the spread of Covid-19.



Additional efforts on behalf of our incarcerated friends were directed at the city and state level with very little movement on either side. Our work for clemency, to release aging prisoners, and reduce the jail population continues. Unfortunately, as New York City rose in protest against police brutality, New York State rolled back bail reforms by playing to public fear of incarcerated people being released.

Prison Writes joined in-person actions at Bedford Hills Correctional Facility, and at representatives' offices in Albany in support of the HALTsolitary campaign. In late June, along with hundreds of community-based organizations, Prison Writes submitted testimony for city council hearings on the NYC budget. We asked that the city reallocate at least one billion dollars from the six billion-dollar NYPD budget to support our communities in every borough.

Women in re-entry, isolated by quarantine at the Women's Prison Association, received *emotional care packages* from Prison Writes, consisting of journals, folders, and instructions for therapeutic journaling. We also included hand-sewn masks for PPE.

We donated hundreds of new books by young adult authors of color for youth in group homes under the care of the New York City Administration for Children's Services (ACS).

At the end of the summer, we collaborated in a special project under ACS to collect narrative writing from young women in foster care. Its goal to increase staff sensitivity and improve services. With thirteen young women, we created an anthology of their work, a power point presentation for staff, and a video. (Find them on our website.) All participants received stipends and android tablets for their contributions.

When a fire on December 5th at Middle Collegiate Church forced women in the WPA shelter next door to evacuate, Prison Writes coordinated with advisory board member, Karen Thomas, and staff-on-site to collect contributions of clothing, toiletries and feminine products for the displaced women.

We are pleased to announce that after five years under the fiscal sponsorship of New York Writers Workshop, Prison Writes recently applied for our own 501(c)(3) status. We will continue to partner with their amazing faculty.

Therapeutic writing is an evidence-based practice that reduces anger, improves sleep, and improves communication with others. Reading and writing are essential tools to achieve educational and career goals. We continue to expand our capacity to bring our model to more partners and participants in innovative and fun ways in 2021 to prevent recidivism, support individuals, and strengthen communities.

The Prison Writes program is incredibly meaningful for the women at Rosie's, many of whom have experienced intimate partner violence, sexual assault, and other forms of trauma. It provides participants with the opportunity to form meaningful relationships with their writing mentors, builds confidence in their knowledge, experiences, and creativity, and empowers them to work through their trauma. The care packages, books, and letters exchanged with their mentors provide a vital link to the community for many women who have no other form of support during their incarceration. During the time we have partnered with Prison Writes, I have noticed the many positive effects that a writing mentorship has had on my patients' mental and physical health -- this really speaks to the healing power of writing.

NEW YORK CITY ADMINISTRATION OF CHILDREN'S SERVICES



BRONXCONNECT







Emotional Support Packages


"I spent 34-and-a-half years in prison, and I can say unequivocally that emotional support is the single most important thing to have. There's nothing more precious than knowing that someone in the outside world cares about you, has thought about you. Hearing your name called for mail or seeing your name on the package list brings such joy; it's the high point of an otherwise bland and boring day filled with routine dullness and isolation. A package doesn't have to contain expensive items. It's not what's inside the package that matters as much as the feeling of love and care that comes with it. An emotional care package always contains the touch of human kindness we all need." -- Karen Thomas

Emotional care packages contain a blank journal and informational folder on therapeutic journaling, affirmations, and writing prompts.

All materials are brand new, attractive, and brightly colored. Our goal is to distribute hundreds more packages this year to alleviate the isolation and suffering of incarceration; especially as we continue to be prohibited from working in person due to Covid-19.

Christina Chiu

Christina Chiu is the winner of the James Alan McPherson Award for her novel *Beauty*, which was also selected as a Kirkus Best Books of 2020. She is also author of *Troublemaker and Other Saints*, a nominee for the Stephen Crane First Fiction Award and winner of the Asian American Literary Award.

Chiu has published in *Tin House, The New Guard, Washington Square, The MacGuffin, Charlie Chan is Dead 2, Not the Only One, Washington Square*; she has won literary prizes from *Playboy, New Stone Circle, El Dorado Writers' Guild,* and others.

Chiu hosts the virtual Let's Talk Books Author Series and curates and cohosts the Pen Parentis Literary Salon in New York City. She is a founding member of the Asian American Writers' Workshop. She received her MFA in creative writing from Columbia University.

Jen Fitzgerald

Jen Fitzgerald is a poet, essayist, photographer, and a native New Yorker who received her MFA in Poetry at Lesley University and her BA in Writing at The College of Staten Island (CUNY). Jen's essays, poetry, and photography has been featured widely, over the past decade, in venues such as *PBS Newshour, Tin House, Boston Review, NER, Colorado Review,* among others.

Her first collection of poetry, *The Art of Work* was published by Noemi Press in September of 2016.

Felix has been appointed to the Department of Mental Health and Hygiene Consumer Advisory Board, and New York City Council's Commission on Community Reinvestment and the Closure of Rikers Island.

He has performed poetry at venues, press conference/rallies, open mics and award ceremonies on the steps of City Hall, at Carnegie Hall, Nuyorican Poets Cafe, Staten Island Fatherhood Awards, and more. His writing has appeared in the *NY Daily News* as an Opinion-Editiorial on the issues of homelessness, and in *City Voices* Newspaper on the issue of removing law enforcement from encounters with those in emotional crisis.

Judith Hannan

Judith is the author of the memoir *Motherhood Exaggerated* (CavanKerry Press) and *The Write Prescription: Telling Your Story to Live with and Beyond Illness*. Her writing has appeared in *Lilith Magazine, The Washington Post, Narratively, Opera News*, among others. Through her work at the Children's Museum of Manhattan, Prison Writes, and the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, she is a writing mentor for those affected by illness, trauma, and social neglect.

Tim O'Mara

Tim lives in Manhattan, where he teaches writing workshops. He writes full-time, having retired in 2017 from a 30-year career as a New York City public middle school special education teacher. Tim's debut novel, the Raymond Donne mystery *Sacrifice Fly* (2012), was nominated for the 2013 "Best First Novel" Barry Award. Subsequent books *Crooked Numbers* (2013), *Dead Red* (2015), and *Nasty Cutter* (2016) — received similar critical acclaim. Tim is editor of *Down to the River*, a crime anthology of short stories set on or near American rivers. He is a member of Mystery Writers of America, PEN America, Irish American Writers & Artists, and International Thriller Writers.

Corey Rowe

Cory Rowe is an Associate Professor of Criminal Justice at LaGuardia Community College and Director of the College Way at Rikers Island. Her research focuses on higher education in prison and the reintegration of formerly incarcerated people. Cory has spent over twenty years working with adults in prisons and youth in detention centers. She holds a BA in African American Studies from the University of Wisconsin, Madison; an MA in Criminal Justice, specializing in Juvenile Justice, from John Jay College; and a PhD in Criminal Justice from the CUNY Graduate Center.

Charles Salzberg



Charles Salzberg is novelist and writing instructor. He is the author of the Shamus Award Nominated Swann's Last Song, and the two sequels, Swann Dives In and Swann's Lake of Despair, which was a Finalist for the Beverly Hills Book Award and the Indie Excellence Award. His Devil in the Hole was named by Suspense magazine as one of the Best Crime Novels of 2013. He has written for such periodicals as Esquire, New York Magazine, Redbook, Elle, Good Housekeeping, The New York Times Book Review, The New York Times Arts and Leisure Section. He was a Visiting Professor of Magazine at the S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications at Syracuse University, and he has also taught writing at Sarah Lawrence, Hunter College, the Writer's Voice, and the New York Writers Workshop, where he is a Founding Member.

Ravi Shankar

Pushcart prize-winning poet, translator, professor and PhD, Ravi Shankar has published and edited over 15 books, including the Muse India award-winning translations of 9th century Tamil poet/saint, Andal, The Autobiography of a Goddess (Zubaan/University of Chicago); The Golden Shovel: New Poems Honoring Gwendolyn Brooks (University of Arkansas) and The Many Uses of Mint: New and Selected Poems 1997-2017 (Recent Works Press). Along with Tina Chang and Nathalie Handal, he co-edited W.W. Norton's Language for a New Century: Contemporary Poetry from the Middle East, Asia & Beyond called "a beautiful achievement for world literature" by Nobel Laureate, Nadine Gordimer. He is founder of *Drunken Boat*, one of the world's oldest electronic journals of the arts. He has taught and performed around the world and appeared in print, radio and TV in such venues as The New York Times, NPR, BBC and the PBS Newshour. He has won awards to the Corporation of Yaddo, the MacDowell Colony, and most recently, his collaborative chapbook, A Field Guide to Southern China written with T.S. Eliot Prize winner George Szirtes, was published in the UK by Eyewear Publishing. He currently holds an international research fellowship from the University of Sydney and his memoir *Correctional* is forthcoming in 2021 with University of Wisconsin Press.

Christian Claudio

Christian Claudio was born in the George Washington Carver Housing Projects in Spanish Harlem, and is a former drug dealer, gang member and formerly incarcerated. During his incarceration Chris left the gang, and committed his life to educating fellow inmates. On September 1, 2005, after serving fifteen years of a thirty-seven year sentence, he was released on parole. Since his release Chris has dedicated his life to educating youth. He is a certified New York State Gang Specialist and founder of a not-for-profit organization, "Throggs Neck – La Famiglia" focusing on reaching out to troubled youth through anti-gang & anti-bullying intervention, prevention, and awareness.

Kahlil Koromantee

Kahlil received his Masters degree in Applied Psychology and Counseling from New York University. He is a New York State certified English teacher using life-coaching techniques specifically geared for teens and young adults whose personal conflicts get in the way of their academic success and overall development. Kahlil taught at the Adolescent Reception and Detention Center at Riker's Island and worked over a decade as a Counselor for at risk students at Borough of Manhattan Community College. Khalil works with youth who are in the criminal or family court system, aging out of foster care, attending male-based programs, transitioning from High School to College, or struggling with their sexual identity. He is adept at motivating hard to reach youths who've suffered trauma and disappointment.

Karen was born and raised in Rensselaer, New York. Graduating from Oneonta University in 1969, she taught high school English and writing in Rensselaer public schools until her arrest in 1982 for the murder of her abusive ex-husband.

During her almost 35 year incarceration she taught GED and ESL, was a college tutor, and assisted women with legal work and resume writing. Karen translated the REACH curriculum into Spanish, and provided training in transmittable disease prevention, and AIDS counseling and education.

Karen is a founding member of the Family Violence Program which is a national model for other correctional facilities. The program improved outcomes for women in the criminal justice system for acts of self-defense against their abusers, requiring juries to consider abuse as a mitigating circumstance, using Karen's experience as an example, as well as other women who testified at the first public domestic violence hearing held in a maximum-security facility.

Karen is fluent in Spanish and provided translation for women for medical appointments, parole, and TRC. While at Albion Karen took a legal research class, going on to work full time in the law library when she moved to Taconic. Karen currently works as supervisor in Women's Prison Association transitional housing.
